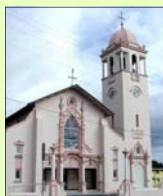

Since they are earthen vessels, we pray that your power shine out through their weakness.

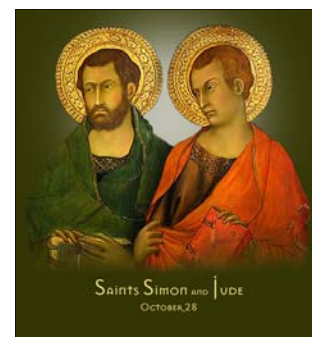

Sts. Simon and Jude : feast day, Oct 28

Jude is so named by Luke and Acts. Matthew and Mark call him Thaddeus. He is not mentioned elsewhere in the Gospels, except, of course, where all the apostles are referred to. Scholars hold that he is not the author of the Letter of Jude. Actually, Jude had the same name as Judas Iscariot. Evidently because of the disgrace of that name, it was shortened to "Jude" in English.

Simon is mentioned on all four lists of the apostles. On two of them he is called "the Zealot." The Zealots were a Jewish sect that represented an extreme of Jewish nationalism. For them, the messianic promise of the Old Testament meant that the Jews were to be a free and independent nation. God alone was their king, and any payment of taxes to the Romans—the very domination of the Romans—was a blasphemy against God. No doubt some of the Zealots were the spiritual heirs of the Maccabees, carrying on their ideals of religion and independence. But many were the counterparts of modern terrorists. They raided and killed, attacking both foreigners and "collaborating" Jews. They were chiefly responsible for the rebellion against Rome which ended in the destruction of Jerusalem in A.D. 70. <http://www.americancatholic.org/features/saintofday>



Sunday Reflection:

30th Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)

October 25, 2009

Jer 31:7-9; Ps 126:1-2, 2-3, 4-5, 6 ; Heb 5:1-6 ; Mk 10:46-52

Today's Gospel story of Blind Bartimaeus, the man who receives his sight from Jesus, brings back memories. In grade school I read a fictional story of the life of Bartimaeus prior to that encounter with Jesus. It's what's called the "back story" in movies, the history of the character not portrayed on the screen. I don't remember the name of that book, but the memory has been with me all these years. Imagining a whole life history for Bartimaeus helps me to put his response to Jesus into a context. We don't know the real story, of course, and can only work with what Mark gives us.

But I think that, like Bartimaeus, each of us is a person with some degree of faith. You wouldn't be attending to my words here if you weren't. Like him, we want to see. Our deepest wishes, our courage when we take a risk, the generosity we might feel in response to God's grace are all inside of us, like they were in Bartimaeus.

Today, God invites us to step out of our personal stories into the lights, in front of the camera, and into the story of the Kingdom. What a thrilling and dramatic moment it is, as we hear the Lord ask us, "What do you want me to do for you?"

Disabilities Ministry

Choosing Words with Dignity: Persons with disabilities are just that —PERSONS. Avoid using such words as crippled, handicapped, dumb, a defect or afflicted, but rather speak to the PERSON. Examples could include using phraseology such as, : “that person is deaf or hard of hearing” rather than he is a deaf mute or deaf and dumb.” When referring to a person with a mental illness, he isn’t “ a mental case or psycho.” A person may have multiple or severe disabilities but shouldn’t be referred to as being “a vegetable, pitiful or a freak.” You can make the difference and with the awareness and proper attitude may too convey compassion and welcome to persons with disabilities throughout our parish communities.

NOVEMBER AT MALIA

Next Sunday is already the first of November. This is the month we put special emphasis on remembering all those loved ones who have died. You are invited to participate in the following special prayerful events remembering our loved ones:

1. The Book of Life: Starting today and throughout the Month of November there will be a white book at the entrance to church. You are invited to write the names of your loved ones into this Book of Life. The Book of Life will be brought and placed on the altar at every weekend Mass. The Weekend Masses will be offered for those whose names are inscribed in The Book of Life.
2. Monday, November 2nd is **All Souls Day**. There will be a Special Mass at 5:15 pm during which we will remember, by name, the parishioners from Malia who died this past year and your loved ones who recently died. You are requested to write the names of your loved ones who you wish to be remembered by name on the All Souls Day envelopes in the pews. These must be placed in the Koa Bowl no later than Sunday, Nov 1. During the All Souls Day Mass the names will be read and you will be invited to light a candle in their memory.
3. Beginning Monday, Nov 2nd, there will be a 5:15 pm Mass at Malia every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. With the exception of the All Souls Day Mass on Monday, Nov 2nd, there will be no music at the 5:15 pm Masses. The Masses will be a very simple Liturgy of the Word and the Eucharist with no Prayer of the Faithful and no Sign of Peace. These Masses are offered as a short but profound Thanksgiving to the Lord at the end of the work day.
4. Beginning Saturday, November 7th and every Saturday there-after, there will be a 5:15 pm Mass in anticipation of Sunday. This will be in addition to our traditional 9:00AM Sunday Mass. The 5:15 Saturday evening Mass will put special emphasis on Families, Youth, and Young Adults. The choir will practice on Saturdays at 4:00 pm for the Sunday Masses. We hope that more instrumentalists and vocalists will join the choir. The Youth and Young Adults are invited to use the Malia facilities after the 5:15 Saturday Mass until 10:00 pm to socialize, communicate, and have fun. (More about this later)

St. Damien De Veuster, from Tremeloo to Hilo

A Seminarian's Life

A year of study passed quickly, and on October 7, 1960, he with other novices pronounced their vows in the cathedral of the Mother House of the Sacred Hearts Fathers on Picpus Street in Paris.

His parents witnessed the ceremony with tears of joy. Their Jef was now a member of the Sacred Hearts Fathers.

Brother Damien's academic journey took him to France for a year and then back to Louvain where he was joyously united with Pamphile. His enormous capacity for work prompted him to study elective courses on top of the prescribed curriculum, and he learned with such ease that many believed he, like Pamphile, was destined for an academic career.

Yet, he did not forego the spiritual aspects of his training, for Pamphile recorded: "Fr. Wenceslaus had preached a sermon one day in which he emphasized three points: Silence, Meditation, and Continual Prayer. My brother, as if writing the words on paper was not enough, wished to have them always before his eyes, so he took his knife and cut them into the wood of his desk." The words, "Silence, Meditation, Prayer," continue to give testimony to the carver's dedication on that very desk now on display in Tremeloo.

St. Joseph's Chapel

The five hundred year old St. Joseph's chapel, next to the Formation House, was being renovated. For at least an hour daily Damien watched the work, fascinated by the workmanship of the craftsmen

However the chapel's tall and rickety chimney stymied the workers, none of whom dared climb the weakened structure to dismantle it.

They were surprised when Damien stepped forward and volunteered to do the job. Quickly a tall ladder was erected against the structure. As workers steadied it Damien clambered to the top and with a mason's hammer dismantled the chimney brick by brick. (Fourteen years later he wrote to his family, "The ten years I have been on the Mission I have built a church or chapel every year. The habit I had at home of practicing different kinds of work is of immense use to me here.")

This is the same chapel that received Damien's remains when they were conveyed from Molokai to Louvain forty-seven years after his death.

Hawaii Calls

Pamphile was ordained in February, 1863 and several months later was assigned with fifteen other priests, nuns and brothers to answer Bishop Louis Maigret's plea for help in the Sandwich Islands. Pamphile was a reluctant missionary, but he had taken a vow of obedience. At best it would be an assignment of short duration. At worst it would mean the end of a scholar's career.

Did he pray that he not be sent? Probably so. Did he think the Lord would use a louse to answer his prayer? Probably not. In August, 1863, a case of typhus appeared in Louvain when a louse bit and defecated on an unfortunate individual. The germ-filled feces infected the poor soul when he or she scratched the itch. The germs invaded the blood stream and resulted in a fatal infection but not before other lice fed on the victim and visited still other Louvainians. By mid-September over a hundred had died, including several physicians and priests who attended to them. As the number of priests dwindled Father Pamphile was quick to answer the call.

Damien, unaware of the epidemic, had just received minor orders on September 19 in Mechelen, (or Malines to the French), Belgium, and as his stagecoach entered Louvain he was surprised and puzzled to find it virtually deserted.

Pamphile toiled heroically for ten days ministering to the sick and dying. One morning, when he failed to appear for Mass, Damien hurried to his room and discovered him in bed shaking with fever

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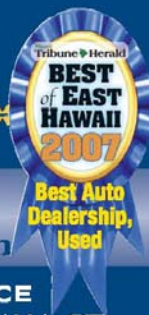
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
