



Sunday Reflection:

January 17, 2010 Second Sunday in Ordinary Time (C)

Is 62:1-5, Ps 96:1-2, 2-3, 7-8, 9-10,1 Cor 12:4-11, Jn 2:1-11

In most cultures, a wedding is a big deal—and sometimes a source of anxiety. Like other priests, I've participated in wedding planning and have listened to brides




and grooms—and their anxious parents—worry about making sure the celebration at church and the reception afterward express the joy and importance of the occasion. And I suspect many of them will no doubt identify with today's Gospel story, the wedding feast of Cana.

We all know the story about how the wine was running out, and how Jesus' mother took the problem to him. The miracle of the water become wine—and good wine at that—is a charming story, to be sure. But there's a deeper dimension.

The Gospel according to John is a story of revelation: In its opening words the Gospel tells us about the Word made Flesh. God has come among us in the person of Jesus Christ. The stories and sayings of Jesus which follow are written to allow us to encounter Jesus as the One come from God. Jesus is revealing his glory to those who would accept him.

And it's appropriate that the beginning of Jesus' signs, as John describes this event at Cana, happens in the very human setting of a wedding, a celebration of human life, joy, and the goodness of God's creation. To find God present, we need only to look for the signs of divinity which are present all around us.


Please Remember in your prayers Sr. Marion Kikukawa

Blessed Mother Marianne Cope

Feast Day: Saturday, January 23

Though leprosy scared off most people in 19th-century Hawaii, that disease sparked great generosity in the woman who came to be known as Mother Marianne of Molokai. Her courage helped tremendously to improve the lives of its victims in Hawaii, a territory annexed to the United States during her lifetime (1898).

Mother Marianne's generosity and courage were celebrated at her May 14, 2005, beatification in Rome. She was a woman who spoke "the language of

truth and love" to the world, said Cardinal Jose Saraiva Martins, prefect of the Congregation for Saints' Causes. Cardinal Martins, who presided at the beatification Mass in St. Peter's Basilica, called her life "a wonderful work of divine grace." Speaking of her special love for persons suffering from leprosy, he said, "She saw in them the suffering face of Jesus. Like the Good Samaritan, she became their mother."

On January 23, 1838, a daughter was born to Peter and Barbara Cope of Hessen-Darmstadt, Germany. The girl was named after her mother. Two years later the Cope family immigrated to the United States and settled in Utica, New York. Young Barbara worked in a factory until August 1862, when she went to the Sisters of the Third Order of Saint Francis in Syracuse, New York. After profession in November of the next year, she began teaching at Assumption parish school.

Marianne held the post of superior in several places and was twice the novice mistress of her congregation. A natural leader, three different times she was superior of St. Joseph's Hospital in Syracuse, where she learned much that would be useful during her years in Hawaii.

Elected provincial in 1877, Mother Marianne was unanimously re-elected in 1881. Two years later the Hawaiian government was searching for someone to run the Kakaako Receiving Station for people suspected of having leprosy. More than 50 religious communities in the United States and Canada were asked. When the request was put to the Syracuse sisters, 35 of them volunteered immediately. On October 22, 1883, Mother Marianne and six other sisters left for Hawaii where they took charge of the Kakaako Receiving Station outside Honolulu; on the island of Maui they also opened a hospital and a school for girls.

In 1888, Mother Marianne and two sisters went to Molokai to open a home for "unprotected women and girls" there. The Hawaiian government was quite hesitant to send women for this difficult assignment; they need not have worried about Mother Marianne! On Molokai she took charge of the home that Blessed Damien DeVeuster (d. 1889) had established for men and boys. Mother Marianne changed life on Molokai by introducing cleanliness, pride, and fun to the colony. Bright scarves and pretty dresses for the women were part of her approach.

Awarded the Royal Order of Kapiolani by the Hawaiian government and celebrated in a poem by Robert Louis Stevenson, Mother Marianne continued her work faithfully. Her sisters have attracted vocations among the Hawaiian people and still work on Molokai. Mother Marianne died on August 9, 1918.

Comment: The government authorities were reluctant to allow Mother Marianne to be a mother on Molokai. Thirty years of dedication proved their fears unfounded. God grants gifts regardless of human short-sightedness and allows those gifts to flower for the sake of the kingdom.

Quote: Soon after Mother Marianne died, Mrs. John F. Bowler wrote in the *Honolulu Advertiser*, "Seldom has the opportunity come to a woman to devote every hour of 30 years to the mothering of people isolated by law from the rest of the world. She risked her own life in all that time, faced everything with unflinching courage and smiled sweetly through it all." (1838-1918)

SJS 2010 National Geographic Bee



The St. Joseph School final and championship rounds of the 2010 National Geographic Bee were held on Friday, January 8th. Two 7th graders, Nathan Ducasse and Sarina Wyrick, and one 6th grader, Conor See, competed for a

chance to take a written qualifying test to earn the opportunity to represent the school at the State Geographic Bee in April in Honolulu. The contestants wrestled with such questions as naming the state in which the presidential retreat of Camp David is located (Maryland), and identifying the location of Saguaro National Park (Arizona), and which island country generates the most the U.S. nuclear energy after and France (Japan). Nathan and Conor made it to the championship round, and Conor emerged as the school champion. Congratulations to Conor, and to all those who participated in this year's National Geographic Bee. The contest is held annually and culminates in the National Geographic Bee held in May in Washington, D.C. and hosted by TV's Alex Trebeck.

When does human life begin? When does one become a person?

There are those who preach that human life begins only with birth, denying that the individual within the womb is indeed a human person worthy of love and protection. If it is not a human being, what in God's name is it? Perhaps this story provides an insight.



Some time ago a fetus of 21 weeks was detected to have *spina bifida*, a serious defect associated with neurologic disability and even death of the baby after birth. However the condition is surgically treatable while the fetus is still in the womb.

A newspaper, USA *Today*, assigned a reporter and photographer to document this achievement, and the photographer witnessed an astonishing event:

In the hushed but crowded operating room where outsiders have gathered to watch a rare medical event--spinal surgery on a child still in his mother's womb--a stool falls with a loud bang.

"Shh," says the surgeon, "You'll wake the baby."

"Out of the corner of my eye I saw the uterus shake, but no one's hands were near it. It was shaking from within. Suddenly an entire arm thrust out of the opening (the incision), then pulled back till just the little hand was showing. The doctor reached over and lifted the tiny hand, which reacted and squeezed the doctor's finger. As if testing for strength, the doctor shook the tiny fist. Samuel (the baby) held firm."

"I took the picture!" Wow!

"It happened so fast that the nurse standing next to me asked, 'What happened?'"

"The child reached out," I said. "Oh they do that all the time."

Saint Agnes

Jan. 21 the Church celebrates the Feast of Saint Agnes, a virgin and martyr of the early persecutions. She was put to death after refusing both a marriage proposal from a prominent Roman family (having already consecrated herself to God), and the offering of tribute to the pagan Gods. Her name is mentioned with the other great martyrs of Rome in the Roman Canon.

It is on this feast day, that the Holy Father appears at the Church of Saint Agnes in Rome. There he blesses two lambs, decorated in red (for martyrdom) and white (for purity), traditionally provided by the Trappists of the Tre Fontane Monastery. Then the lambs are taken to the Convent of Saint Cecilia, where the Sisters care for them. The wool sheared from them is used to weave the palliums worn by the Pope and the Archbishops, and which are conferred on new recipients on the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul on the 29th of June.




