

"But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." -Matthew 5:44

"So be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect."

Can a person be perfect? Isn't there a saying that no man is perfect? Is Christ asking the impossible? But probably we are asking the wrong question. Probably our question should not be "is it possible?". Rather, it should be "HOW is it possible?"

Well first of all, "to be perfect", in Greek "Teleos" as intended by today's gospel does not mean to be free from any flaws or defects. Rather it is to be understood in the sense of "To be complete". Hence, we are not being asked to reach a certain level of perfection to please God but rather to allow God to finish or to complete the work that he has began in us.

Now we can see the truth in this challenge of Jesus that sheds light to his earlier pronouncement on how to deal with our enemies. "Love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your heavenly Father." Why? Because this is the way His Father acts - "He makes his sun rise on the bad and the good, and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust." In effect, the Father's love is not only all-embracing but also without limit. This is the kind of love that Jesus wants His disciples to have.

But before we romanticize these words of Jesus especially in a society where revenge and self- centeredness seems to prevail, Jesus Himself is the first to admit that love does not transform enemies into instant friends. In fact, in the end, His enemies succeeded to have Him put to death. Neither will love solve all our personal and the world's problems. But we must keep on loving because that is the way of the Father and the way of Jesus. To "be perfect even as your heavenly Father is perfect" is therefore to be an icon of God's universal salvific love,

Can we then be perfect? Through the Grace of God this is what we are empowered to be!

THE ONE TO BE BAPTIZED

Children who have not reached the "age of discretion" (7 years old) must be initiated using this rite. Children age seven and older must be initiated through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, adapted for children (cf. Rite of Baptism for Children, Introduction, 1; RCIA, 252, ff.; National Statutes, 18 - 21)

B. PARENTS

- 1. Formation is a fundamental element of Christian Initiation. It must be connected with the sacrament of Baptism, "the sacrament of faith." (Cf. GDC 66)
 Sacramental preparation for the sacrament of Baptism for parents is a prerequisite for the baptism of an infant. (Cf. CIC, can. 867) Pastoral discretion is required concerning the frequency of such preparation.
- 2. It is the responsibility of the parents to request baptism as soon as possible after the birth or before the birth of their child. They should go to their pastor or his delegate to request the sacrament for their child. (Cf. CIC, can. 867)
- 3. In an intact marriage, at least one parent/legal guardian should be a baptized Catholic. The non-Catholic parent must be willing to allow his/her child to be baptized in the Catholic Church. The sacrament should not be celebrated if the non-Catholic parent expresses strong opposition because the event of the sacrament should not

divide the family. In cases where there is opposition, pastoral counseling should present options for future celebration of the sacrament when conditions are more favorable.

- 4. In case of divorce, the custodial parent may seek baptism. Civil law defines "custodial parent" as the one who at that moment has physical custody of the child.
- 5. Although the rite is insistent on the preparation of parents/guardians, none of the following may be made requirements for baptism of a child:
- a. Convalidation of an invalid marriage b. Any demonstrations of financial support, e.g., envelopes. c. Any other obligation not found in Church law concerning baptism. (CIC 868 1.1)
- 6. According to the precepts of Canon Law (CIC 857 2), parents requesting Baptism of their child should ordinarily be members of the parish. With special permission of their pastor they may request Baptism in another parish.
- 7. Baptism shall not be refused to parents who have no permanent domicile. People without a parish, e.g. migrants and transients, are to be the objects of special solicitude and need to be dealt with in the best pastoral way possible. Special care should be taken in each individual case.

SEEKING VOLUNTEER FACILITATORS

The Infant Baptism Ministry is seeking adult volunteers to assist with the facilitating of the preparation class. The class meets monthly for 10 out of the 12 months a year. The curriculum is simple utilizing a training video and various handouts. The amount of time allotted for this ministry is about three hours per month every other month with the rotation of other team members. Rite of Sending: second public rite for those becoming Catholic; marks transition from inquiry period to catechumenate period and "sends" them to the Rite of Election with the Bishop

MARCH 4 (5:00 PM MASS w/Bishop Silva)

Rite of Election: a liturgical rite that takes place at the beginning of Lent which formally names those who will be baptized at the next Easter Vigil
